

# Tollcross Primary School Standards and Quality Report 2024 to 2025



## Context of our School

Tollcross Primary is a co-educational, non-denominational school serving the Tollcross and Fountainbridge community. We have 9 classes P1- P7, this includes 1 composite P4/5 class. Our building provides accommodation for one Nursery class ( Tollcross Room) and Tollcross Community Centre. One Nursery class (Lochrin Room) is located in our playground.

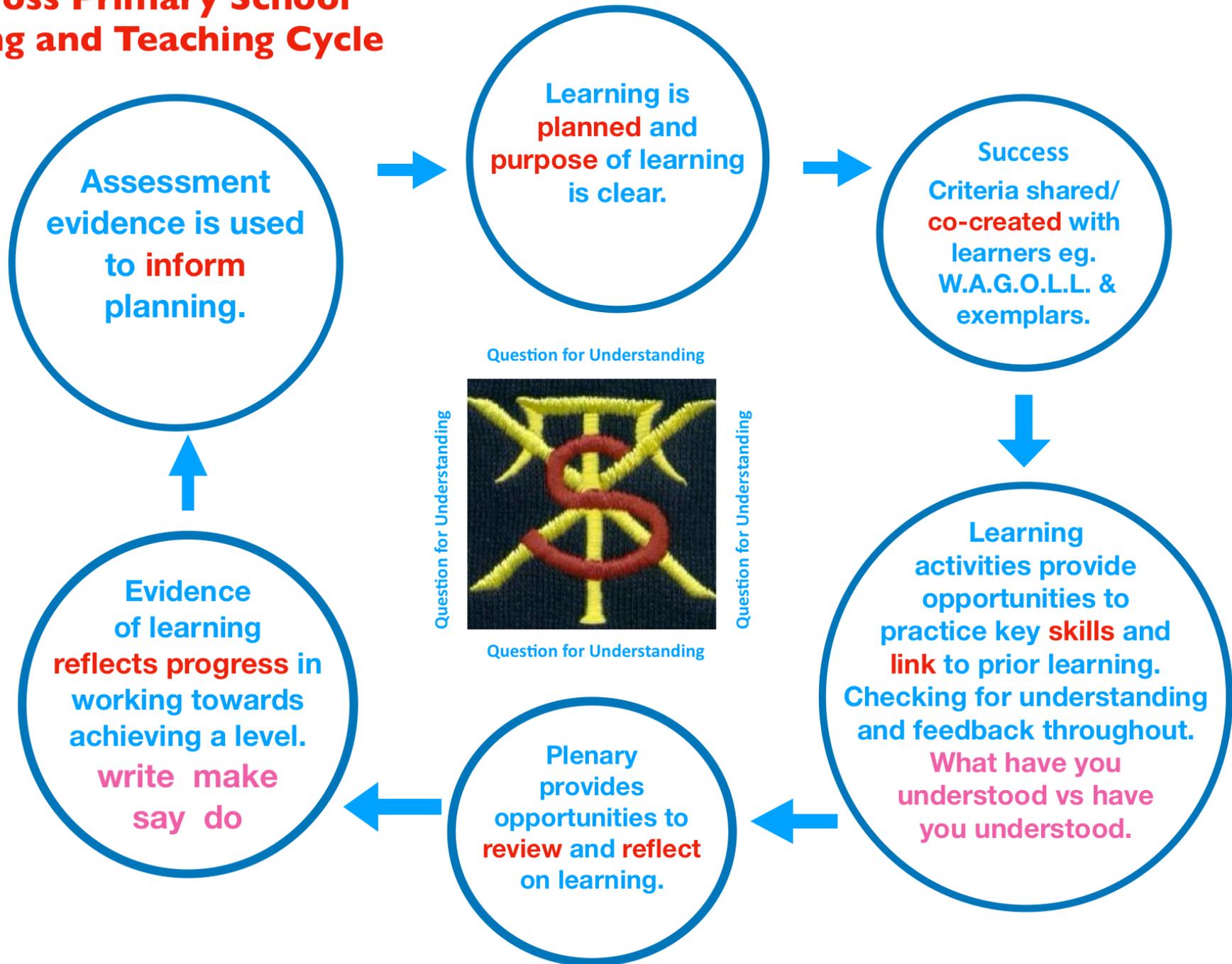

## Context of our School

- Tollcross Primary sits firmly within the community, we have strong partnerships locally.
- Tollcross Primary was inspected by Education Scotland (HMI) in January 2025.
- Parents are very supportive of the school and we have a high level of trust in our school community.
- We have strong partnerships with our campus nursery classes and an Early Years Practitioner supporting play based learning in our P1 class.
- Tollcross Primary is exceptionally well placed to continue to develop as an excellent place to learn.
- Equity is central to our school ethos, pupils and families have not paid for trips and visits for many years at Tollcross, this is a significant strength of the school.
- Developing digital literacy has been a key focus this year, this is part of the CEC Empowered Learning strategy. Our approach to digital learning was highlighted as a strength during our recent Education Scotland (HMI) inspection in January 2025.
- We have a team of very dedicated Pupil Support Assistants who provide high quality support to many pupils through a variety of successful interventions. These interventions are reviewed and adapted to meet the needs of our children.
- We work closely with our colleagues in the James Gillespie's High School Learning Community.
- We continue to seek support from partner agencies and local partners to offer the best service to our children and their families.
- CLPL is well embedded with staff having opportunities to share expertise and engage in professional learning across our learning community
- We have a Pupil Support Officer who has a wellbeing, family support and improving attendance remit.
- 52% of our children have English as an additional language, 50 different languages are spoken by the families in our school.
- 10.2 % of our families reside SIMD 1, 2 and 3.     22.8% of our families reside in SIMD 8, 9 and 10.
- 0.8% of our children are care experienced.
- Our school roll changes significantly throughout the session due to high mobility in the city centre, our current school roll is 246.
- The Head Teacher is currently supported by a Deputy Head Teacher and Principal Teacher.

## Strategies and Capacity for Continuous School Improvement

At Tollcross Primary we use a range of data to focus on improvement through self-evaluation:

- Views of families, children and staff are gathered and used to inform school improvement planning.
- We have a very supportive Parent Council who support the work of the school.
- Data is used to help identify school improvement priorities and learners who require targeted support.
- All staff participate in an annual performance conversations to identify opportunities for career long professional learning.
- Termly Planning and Attainment meetings track individual progress in learning and identify the impact of targeted interventions.
- Sharing classroom practice is used to identify and share effective teaching and learning across our school.
- A team from Education Scotland (HMI) visited our school on the 7th, 8th and 9th January 2025 to support our school self-evaluation process.
- The Education Scotland (HMI) team visited every class and led focus groups with a range of stakeholders; pupils, parents, partners and staff to gather evidence and data.
- The Education Scotland (HMI) report for Tollcross Primary was published on 18/3/2025 and identified key strengths and next steps for school improvement planning.

**Strategic planning for continuous improvement.**

All teaching staff have participated in Short Life Working Groups this session. This has involved working collaboratively to take forward our school improvement priorities.

Clear and concise guidance was shared with each Short Life Working Group at the beginning of the process and feedback was provided to support the work of the group.

Short Life Working Groups have provided opportunities for teachers and PSAs to lead school improvement through a collaborative learning approach.

Data gathered from teaching staff shows that all teachers consider Short Life Working Groups to be a very effective approach to school improvement.

The work of the Short Life Working Groups is clearly aligned to our school improvement priorities outlined in our school improvement plan.

A numeracy assessment tracker was created to monitor learner progress across CfE levels.

Right of the Month was introduced and has raised awareness of UNCRC across our school, all classes engaged in the activities related to exploring the right of the month across the school year.

The Creating a Culturally Inclusive Curriculum group attended the Education Scotland Anti Racist training in November 2024.

Data gathered from Family Fridays indicates that parents enjoyed sharing classroom learning and participating alongside their child.

Review our approach to high quality assessments.

<p>All teaching staff participated in Digital Learning Hubs this session with a focus on improving digital literacy. This is part of our Empowered Learning Strategy. **Effective Use of Assessment**

Teachers worked collaboratively to plan a cycle of moderation using our adapted moderation guidance.

Teachers planned a writing lesson collaboratively, identifying success criterion to support moderation.

We adapted our writing standard to support moderation of writing this year.

A Moderation Guide was created to provide clear and concise guidance for teaching staff to support the moderation process.

P7 and P4 SNSA assessments were carried out in March to inform teacher judgement of achievement of a Level.

Moderation of 2 pieces of writing for every learner in session 2024 to 2025.

Summary feedback was shared and used to identify learners who were on track/ not on track with writing.

All written work moderated was numbered and unnamed to ensure that the writing was assessed without any prior knowledge.

Moderating in groups helped to build teacher confidence in assessing achievement of a level, engage in professional dialogue and develop a shared understanding of achievement of a level.

The SNSA data was used with evidenced gathered through out the school year to inform teacher judgement of achievement of a level and identify support required.

Our adapted moderation guidance provided a clear structure and plan for moderation across our school.

Assessment evidence gathered through moderation supported teacher judgement of achievement of a level.

In session 2024 to 2025 most children in P1, P4 and P7 achieved expected levels in writing.

SNSA data was used to support professional discussions about learner progress and next steps during Planning and Attainment meetings in May 2025.

To use feedback from session 2024 to 2025 to improve our moderation approach going forward.

Include 3rd Level in our writing standard to capturing the progress of learners working beyond 2nd Level.

To use our experience of moderation of writing and high quality numeracy assessment to inform our approach to moderation of numeracy across our school.

To continue to plan for SNSA assessment to be carried out in March and April for P4 and P7.

A Pupil Support Officer with a family link and attendance remit provides both targeted and universal support for families.

The Pupil Support Officer and Head Teacher meeting monthly to review the impact of additional personalised support to improve attendance for children with attendance below **85%**

Attendance is tracked monthly to identify children with persistently low attendance. Our PSO works directly with families to identify barriers to attendance with the aim of offering support to increase attendance at school.

Our Attendance data shows that we are making progress in reducing absence below 85%. Our attendance overall for all pupils is currently 93% which is the average for Edinburgh schools.

Attendance data shows a 60% increase in overall attendance ( 85% or above) by June 2025.

Implementation of appropriate interventions and support has resulted in increased attendance for most children whose previous attendance was below 85%.

To monitor attendance monthly and identify strategies that support children and their families to improve attendance at school.

**Attainment over time**

We have reviewed and updated our tracking system to ensure that data gathered builds a clear picture of learner attainment in literacy and numeracy over time.

We have used the City of Edinburgh electronic pupil tracking system this year.

Effective transitions are in place from nursery to P1, stage to stage and P7 to high school.

All staff demonstrate confidence in using data to make judgements about attainment levels.

Summary attainment and progress data is shared with all staff in June to support planning for continuity in learning and effective transition between stages.

Most learners continue to make appropriate progress in both literacy and numeracy over time. The FOCUS tool shows that we are in line and in some areas above our comparator schools.

Summary attainment data forms the basis of teacher transition conversations to ensure continuity in learning and support.
